Southeast Area Research Center Tour

June 6, 2023

Meet Dr. Jaymeylynn Farney and tour the Southeast Area Research Facility

The Southeast Research-Extension Center is located in Parsons, Kansas. The center is a unit within the Eastern Kansas Research-Extension Centers, and is a part of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station and Cooperative Extension Service.

Research at the Southeast Research and Extension area has focused primarily on practical cattle management practices for tame grasses. Types of research include:

- Supplementation effects on cattle gains while grazing different varieties of fescue
- Supplementation effects on cattle gains while grazing bromegrass
- Effects of legumes interseeded in fescues and bermudagrass pastures
- Effects of cattle gains while grazing crabgrass and bermudagrass that has been interseeded with winter wheat
- Whole systems research that evaluates how stocker cattle management may impact finishing cattle performance and carcass composition
- Evaluation of selectivity of cover crops for grazing cattle
- Re-evaluation of nitrate toxicity with cover crops
- Chelated minerals for spring calving operations on fescue
- Spices in minerals for cattle gains, fly control, and tick management
- Use of virtual fencing

Round Robin Updates - Cowley County Fair

GRAND CHAMPION SHOWMAN/ROUND ROBIN CONTEST

Superintendents: Tina Bailey and Carol Mackey

- 1. The Champion and Reserve Champion Showman from the SENIOR divisions in Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Horse, Sheep, Meat Goats, Dairy Goats and Swine are eligible to compete for Grand Champion Livestock Showman and Reserve Grand Champion Livestock Showman. To be eligible for the Round Robin a participant must place 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or 4th in a Division. Each Senior Division is required to place a 4th Place Finisher.
- 2. Participants must show the same animal which qualified them for this event. Participants who qualify in multiple species will be allowed to choose which one of their Champion or Reserve Champion showman animals they want to show in the Round Robin. Example: If a showman won Champion Meat Goat Showman and Reserve Champion Beef Showman. They qualified in the first specie shown (Meat Goat) but they may choose to show their own beef calf in Round Robin and draw for a Meat Goat to walk in the Meat Goat round. Participants who have multiple species are not allowed to use their 3rd or 4th place species.
- 3. After an exhibitor is named Champion Senior Showman or Reserve Champion Senior Showman within a division (dairy cattle, dairy goats, beef, sheep, meat goats, horse or swine), they are deemed as the automatic qualifiers in that division. They may not qualify in any other species for Grand Champion Showman. Exhibitors may show in subsequent showmanship classes, but the automatic qualifiers will be based on the first species they qualify in. The remaining open spots in the Round Robin will be filled from eligible 3rd Place Showman at the conclusion of the last show of the fair. If there are still openings after all eligible 3rd Place finishers, then 4th place finishers will be inserted using the same procedure and preference order. The order used will be based on the Preference Order. The 2023 Preference Order for 3rd and 4th place showman will be Dairy Cattle, Swine, Sheep, Beef, Meat Goat, Horse, Dairy Goat. The Preference Order will rotate annually.
- 4. For species with limited Senior exhibitors: Should a Senior contestant elect not to participate in the Round Robin, it will be their responsibility to permit the use of their animal for the purpose of the Round Robin contest. In the event that there is not a contestant from each specie, every effort will be made by species' superintendents to locate animals for use by the exhibitors in the Round Robin.
- Participants will draw for the animal they will show in each species except as noted in Rule 2 above and for 3rd or 4th Place Qualifiers based on Rule 3. 3rd and 4th place species qualifiers from Rule 3 will be allowed to use their animal from the species shown when they qualified for Round Robin competition.
- 6. Previous winners of the Grand Champion Showman award at the fair are eligible to compete.

Horse Safety - REQUIRED for KSF

As part of the qualification requirements for the Kansas State Fair 4-H Horse Show, members must complete the Horse Safety Webinar and pass the quiz. They will both be available on the Kansas 4-H Equine Webinar page http://bit.ly/3zbn5XC on Monday, April 24th at 7pm. They must be completed prior to the entry deadline (August 1, 2023).

General Rules:

NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ACCIDENTS

Rodeo is limited to Cowley County 4-Hers only

- 1. 4-Hers must pre-enter at the Extension Office by July 5,2023
- 2. All participants must wear their contestant's number to enter the arena.

Contestants must check in with Rodeo Secretary upon arrival.

3. A 2023 Horse ID will be required of each horse participating in the Rodeo.

Horse ID's will be checked prior to the start of the Rodeo. Any horse that doesn't have an ID will not be allowed to participate.

- 4. No contestant will be awarded a prize until official entry blank has been approved and double-checked.
- 5. Good conduct and sportsmanship will be expected of all contestants, parents/guardians, and spectators. Failure to comply with the Rules and Regulations will be cause for immediate disqualification.
- 6. Dress Code: Long sleeve collared shirt, long pants, boots, western hat (optional) -Absolutely NO caps.
- 7. All horseback participants should participate in the grand entrance.

DRESS CODE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

- 8. No running of horses outside of arena
- 9. No double riding allowed, No leading by another rider, no saddle restraints or seatbelts, unless proven to be medically necessary.
- 10. Participants must be ready at the gate when their name is called. Their name will be called 3 times- if they are not at the gate then they will not be allowed to compete and will receive no points in that event.
- 11. Volunteers/ assistance throughout the events are welcome. If you are interested in being responsible for setting up the event, running the gate during the event, etc. Please let the event coordinator know you are interested in helping.
- 12. We intend for these rodeos to be fun learning experiences for the youth. Please be respectful of the youth and their families in your actions. Please also keep the grounds clean.
- 13. All Timed events will be flagged and not ran by a timer.

Breeding Bulls Division - Cowley County Fair

Cowley County Fair Division-Breeding Bulls

- 1.Bulls must arrive the day of the show (Friday, August 4, 2023) and will be released directly following the show.
- 2.Upon arrival, there will be a beef superintendent and a fair board member present for unloading. It will be at their discretion to determine that the animal is safe to continue stalling and show.
- 3. Bulls will be allowed to stall at the participant's designated area.
- 4. Bulls may only be shown in the bull division
- 5.Bulls over 24 months of age will be ineligible to show
- 6.All bulls 12 months or older must have nose control or nose clip.
- 7.Bulls are to only be allowed to stall in the East and West outside portions of the beef barn, and are at no time allowed in the middle, inside portion of the beef barn.
- 8. There must be an adult present with the participant at all times that the bull is not stalled, with the exception of entering the show ring, and exiting the show ring. An adult will escort from stalling to the show arena and again back to stalling.

Cowley County Fair King & Queen

The Cowley County Fair King & Queen Contest is designed to bring to the attention of the general public the outstanding youth of our county, to promote youth development organizations involved with the fair and to promote the Cowley County Fair. Entry Deadline - July 1, 2023. All applications will be reviewed by the judging committee prior to the Cowley County Fair. Late applications will not be accepted.

RULES:

- 1. Each Cowley County Fair Group, FFA Chapter or 4-H Club may nominate King and Queen candidates from their eligible membership.
- 2. All contestants must be nominees of one Cowley County organization named above.
- 3. All contestants must be exhibitors in the Cowley County Fair in the year nominated.
- 4. All contestants must be between 14 and 18 years of age before January 1 of the current year.
- 5. Contestants who have previously served as King or Queen will not be considered.
- 6. Contestants who have not served as King or Queen may re-enter the contest.
- 7. Final selection of King and Queen will be made by a combination of judges' scores and balloting by Cowley County Fair board members.
- 8. Candidates may not bring additional items, such as scrap books, photo albums, etc. into the interviews. Judges' selections will be based solely on the written application and personal interview.
- 9. All nominees must complete the King and Queen Entry Form and return to Cowley County Extension, 311 E 9th St. (P.O. Box 538), Winfield, 67156 by 5:00 p.m. on or before July 1.
- 10. Interviews will be the week of July 11th-17th.
- 11. Winners will be announced on July 19 and notified via (phone/email/mail).

INTERVIEWS: Face to face interviews will be conducted by three or more judges selected by the Cowley Fair Board King and Queen Committee. Date and location of the interview TBD. Face to face is defined as physically in the room with the judges. No additional materials may be brought to the interviews.

SCORING: Scoring will be done as follows:

- 1. Cowley County Fair Activities 30%
- 2. Club or Chapter Activities 15%
- 3. School, Church, Community Activities 10%
- 4. Poise and Personality 20%
- 5. Personal Appearance 10%

RESPONSIBILITY OF COWLEY FAIR QUEEN AND KING COURT:

- Attend all Cowley County Fair shows and sales during the current fair. May be excused to attend functions to represent Cowley with approval of Cowley Fair King and Queen Committee or committee advisors.
- 2. Must be available to present awards to all Cowley Fair Shows, responsibilities being divided if one or the other is showing.
- 3. A schedule of time and places where attendance is required will be provided by the Cowley Fair King and Queen Committee. The King and Queen will be responsible for assigning all court members to Cowley County Fair shows and events. Court members will meet immediately following the coronation to review responsibilities.
- 4. The King and Queen shall represent Cowley County Fair.

Kansas State Fair/Grand Drive Changes

GROOMING RULE UPDATE (ALL SPECIES): FULL FIT SHOW

Junior Livestock Show Grooming: The purpose of grooming rules for junior exhibitors is to promote the program as a learning experience for youth. All junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals throughout the show. Grooming at the Kansas State Fair for the breeding and market animal shows may include the use of adhesives, paints, and powders. Twine, other artificial material or hair not from the animal itself are not allowed.

Grooming at the Kansas State Fair for the showmanship competition shall be "no fit"/ "blow and go." Adhesives, paints, and powders are not allowed.

Immediate family members of current Kansas 4-H or FFA members exhibiting may provide grooming and care to assist the junior exhibitor, regardless of whether the exhibitor is present while such grooming and/or care is being provided. Immediate family members include parents, legal guardians, siblings, and grandparents.

Individuals who do not meet the definition of an immediate family member or are not exhibitors at the show, but wish to provide consulting assistance to exhibitors, shall be deemed "Livestock Helpers." A Livestock Helper may only provide verbal guidance, consultation, and educational assistance. Hands-on assistance by Livestock Helpers is not allowed any time during the show.

Livestock Helpers must register with the Grand Drive office either at the time of entry by the relevant exhibitor(s) or during the State Fair. During registration, Livestock Helpers must submit documentation with the State Fair office containing the names of all exhibitors they wish to help. Livestock Helpers must wear a visible badge while in the barns providing guidance and verbal assistance.

Livestock Helpers found to be grooming or caring for animals will be warned once by the Competitions Director or their designee and upon the second violation may have their credentials revoked. An entry that has been groomed by a Livestock Helper may be disqualified.

Violations of this rule are subject to all penalties afforded by all applicable Kansas State Fair rules and may include revocation of Livestock Helper credentials for up to two years.

4-H AND FFA BEEF CATTLE RULE UPDATES (BEEF CATTLE EXHIBITORS ONLY):

NO CHUTES IN TIE SPACES IN THE CATTLE BARN

Stall chutes and " EZstay, Straight Up type bars" are allowed in stalls when in use only and cannot take up cattle space.

Only on show day may chutes be placed in aisles. This applies to steer exhibitors on Saturday and heifer exhibitors on Sunday. Please angle and space your chutes so that cattle can be moved to the ring. Do not block the entire aisle.

Chutes may be placed in open space along North and East walls of the barn and in open space in the Southeast part of the tie barn/ Prairie Pavilion.

Please plan and coordinate chute sharing with others from your county.

NO PENS OR PANELS IN TIE OUTS

No pens, extra panels or end panels will be allowed in the tie outs.

If pens/panels are set up the exhibitor will receive one warning to remove immediately, and if not removed will be removed by KSF staff.

Tie out space is limited to only the animals that are checked in to the show, not the number of cattle entered.

"Tying out" in the dairy barn or to the chain link fence is not allowed.

Tie out space is not assigned by club/county, and if excessive space is used by an exhibitor the show management and KSF staff have the right to condense the exhibitor's space.

Beef Classic Entry Form

General Rules

Entry is open to any bonafide 4-H or FFA member. Exhibitors must be at least 7 years old and not have passed their 19th birthday before January 1, 2023

The entry fee is \$30/head by April 10, 2023. After April 10, entry will be \$35/head. Entry fee may be mailed with official entry blank or presented at check-in. Pre-entries are preferred. **All pre-entered exhibitors will receive a show t-shirt.**

Cash awards will be given to the top three Market and top three Breeding animals (\$750, \$500, \$300). Prizes will be awarded for Showmanship and Class winners.

There will be no limit on the number of entries per exhibitor.

Heifer and steer check in begins at 7:00 a.m. All entries must be checked in and weight cards are due by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 15, 2023. No stalling, no bedding available. Must show off the trailer. Generators are encouraged. Exhibitors are to clean up their area before leaving the grounds.

A minimum of 3 head is required to show as a breed. There will be an AOB class if needed. The show management reserves the right to alter and/or combine classes.

Heifers must be accompanied by registration papers or a copy of transfer papers in the member's name. There will be a commercial heifer class for all unregistered heifers. Maximum heifer birth date shall be no sooner than January 1 of the previous year.

Market Steers will show by breed and weight. The Market Heifers will show by weight.

The showmanship contest is open to all exhibitors and will be conducted as follows: Senior (14 and over), Intermediate (10-13), Junior (7-9). Age is determined before January 1, 2023.

There will be a separate Market and separate Breeding class for Cowley County Exhibitors with no entry fee.

The Cowley County Classic will be a full-fit show.

General Rules

Entry is open to any bonafide 4-H or FFA member. Exhibitors must be at least 7 years old and not have passed their 19th birthday before January 1, 2023.

The entry fee is \$15/head and \$5 per exhibitor for showmanship by May 1, 2023. Entries received after May 1 are \$25/head. All pre-entered exhibitors will receive a show t-shirt. Entry fee is to defray expenses of the show. No refunds. Judge's decision will be final.

Animals shown in the market classes are not eligible to show in the breeding classes and vice versa.

Everyone must check in at the registration table prior to weighing. This includes in-county, out of county, breeding and market entries.

Market lambs must be slick-shorn to one quarter inch, to the hock. Wool on the face and below the hock is allowed.

Market Goats will be shown clipped to 3/8" or less. All classes will be split by weight.

All goats must be dehorned or tipped and rounded.

All wethers must be castrated/banded prior to coming to the show. No bucks/rams allow.

The showmanship contest is open to all exhibitors and will be conducted as follows: Senior (14 and over), Intermediate (10-13), Junior (7-9).

Age is determined before January 1, 2023. All animals shown in showmanship classes must be owned by the exhibitor.

Classes will be determined by weight and specified by committee. Classes will be determined at the conclusion of weigh-in.

Each exhibitor will be allowed to show only two head in market and two head in breeding classes.

No stalling, no bedding available. Must show off the trailer. Generators are encouraged. Exhibitors are to clean up their area before leaving the grounds.

All lambs must have lamb teeth, all goats must have kid teeth. All sheep and goats must have scrapes tag. No yearling ewes or yearling does. NO MISTREATMENT OF ANIMALS WILL BE TOLERATED.

HEALTH REQUIREMENT: Animals that are ill, have soremouth, and/or "club lamb" fungus **will not be allowed to show.** Decision of veterinarian is final.

The use of artifical coloring, except on hooves is prohibited.

Each exhibitor must groom his/her own animal and may use only the assistance of an immediate family member (mother, father, legal guardian, brother, sister) or another 4-H/FFA member who is an exhibitor at the show.

A special peewee showmanship class for children less than 7 years old will be offered during fitting and showing. **Peewees may ONLY exhibit in fitting and showing.

Goats must be shown with all four feet on the ground. Exhibitors may use a collar, a collar with a short lead or a halter when showing. Medium (3mm) or smaller pinch collars will be allowed.

There will be a separate Market and separate Breeding class for Cowley County Exhibitors with no entry fee.

Do you know how much meat that animal provided after the fair? What is your goal as you feed this animal and how did you do? Hanging weight, back fat, pounds of product.

The intent of this essay is to dig deeper into the production side of the industry, learning from publications and professionals in our area. You will want to plan to have it proofed by multiple people.

Anglers can fish year round but entries must be in by the deadline, fish caught after the deadline may be entered in the next contest. Participants can enter in any species/categories that they catch fish – go fishing and have fun!!!

One 4-H Angler of the Year will be named in each of the species/category listed below. These are fish commonly found in Kansas waters. Each Angler of the Year will receive a frameable certificate and a Wal Mart gift certificate to hopefully be used for fishing equipment (one per individual). All other participants that enter a certified entry will receive a \$5 gift certificate.

- 2. Entry must be measured by length, weighed on a digital scale, verified by a witness, and be accompanied by a photo of the entry. (This is a minimum entry to receive an award.) Please use the 2023 entry form. To compete for **Angler of the Year Award** the entry must be weighed and nbwitnessed. Only one Angler of the Year award per individual will be awarded. We want to recognize as many participants as possible. Please use the 2023 Entry Form.
- 4. Fish must be caught by a legal method as outlined in the current Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks Fishing Regulations Summary. Fish can be caught anywhere in the state of Kansas
- 5. YOUNG ANGLERS MUST CATCH THEIR OWN FISH! The past few years some very small/young anglers have caught some very big fish that would have required significant assistance from an adult. Remember, I am a lifetime fisherman, have taught hundreds of fishing clinics, and am a retired fisheries biologist. PLEASEPARENTS OR OTHER ADULTS, LET THE KIDS CATCH THEIR OWN FISH. Questionable situations may be investigated.
- 6. Entries must be postmarked by September 15th or e-mailed/texted by that date.. Winners will be announced around October 1, 2023. Every effort will be made to have the awards available to the counties by their achievement awards program for presentation at the program or sent directly to the winners.
