Being a Host

Typically, when we are talking about being a host, we think of things like serving as hosts for a 4-H club meeting. As hosts for the meeting, we are responsible for setting up the meeting room, providing refreshments and cleaning up when the meeting is over. As hosts, we think about hosting others in our home-maybe for a family dinner or gathering of friends. What are some of the concepts that constitute a "good host"? In our homes, we usually provide a neat, clean environment. Preparation may include cleaning house, putting things away, tidying up and preparing a meal. If the event has a theme, we might decorate to reflect the theme and provide refreshment that reflects that.

What are some other things that a good host does? A good host is welcoming. They greet others warmly, and make the guests want to attend. This would include a greeting at the door, introductions, maybe a handshake and a smile. Good hosts

explain where things are and provide information that is helpful to the visitor(s).

I bring up the topic of being a good host this month not because our 4-H families are doing a poor job of providing great refreshments at club meetings and not because Thanksgiving is coming up. This is the beginning of the new 4-H year. Many clubs will have new visitors to our club meetings this month. Families will visit different clubs to find out which is the right fit for them and if Cowley County 4-H is the right fit. As 4-H members, we get used to the way we do things. Sometimes, we take for granted that 4-H has it's own language and traditions. These are new or different to visitors and can be intimidating or frustrating as a newcomer.

It is important for all of us to remember to be good hosts throughout the 4-H year. Welcome new families into your club, don't just leave it up to your leader(s). Recognize that you have visitors and answer any questions that they might have. Let them know what generally happens during the meeting and share some of the fun things you do throughout the year. Make yourself available to help a new family. After they have attended one meeting, welcome them back at the next meeting. Even families whose parents grew up in 4-H need to be made to feel welcome. 4-H is an ever evolving and changing organization. It's important to give all of our members the tools they need to be successful and help them enjoy their 4-H experience. Welcoming that new family at your next meeting could mean developing a lifelong friendship!

A club's constitution and bylaws help to define and outline the administration of a club. It is imperative that new clubs determine their constitution and bylaws before becoming chartered by the National 4-H Council. The articles of the constitution and bylaws determine the official name of the club, state where and when meetings will be held, set up how business will be conducted, determine officers and even allow for planning of dissolution. Officers of existing organizations should review the club's bylaws annually. Clubs should also provide a copy of their bylaws to the Cowley County Extension Office. Officer teams that have not reviewed current bylaws are encouraged to do so under the guidance of adult leadership. Grant Funding Information

Is your club thinking about applying for grant funds for an upcoming event or activity? At the July 2013 meeting, the Cowley County Extension Council Executive Board voted to review all grant submissions made in the name of 4-H (any applicant, any funding source). This step will allow the Cowley County Extension Council Finance Committee to review all submissions to provide insight and suggestions. This also insures that the 4-H clover is used appropriately and non-discrimination/equal opportunity components exist. There are also situations where funds might have to be processed through Kansas State University.

If your club or project leaders are considering grant applications or extra funding sources, please submit in writing a copy of the grant application to Kelsey at least 5 business days prior to the grant deadline. We encourage creativity in fundraising and applaud the efforts of groups seeking external funding sources.

Clover buds participate in hands-on, age-appropriate learning experiences giving them a preview the Cowley County 4-H Program. Junior Leaders

Junior Leaders is a monthly leadership group for 4-H members age 12 (before January 1 of the current program year- 2017) and older. They meet the 3rd Monday of each month. On odd numbered months, the meeting will begin following 4-H Council (7:45), and on even-numbered months, the meeting begins at 7:00. All meeting are held in the Extension Office Meeting Room. Junior Leaders complete a leadership project annually as individuals, participate in service projects, raise money for a bi-annual trip and take a group trip bi-annually. Be available to assist with room set up on
Friday afternoon, the day prior, to the event.
Be available the day of the event to work at
the front "Information Table" and to check on
judges periodically during the day.
Bring judges items they need, and collect score
sheets for the tabulation room.

Check in with each room to be certain that room monitors are present, and find substitutes in the event of an absence.

Sort completed score sheets by club.

Be available to assist with room clean up on Saturday late morning. Rearrange classrooms, and return all items to the appropriate location. Return all Extension supplies (easels, ribbons, score sheets, pencils, tape, signs, etc.) to the Extension van.

Extension Office Duties:

Collect entries and produce a schedule for the event.

Send judging correspondence to judges.

Orientate judges prior to the judging start time. Provide paper, pencils, judge packets, door signs and other supplies as needed by the committee.

Publicize the event in the 4-H newsletter, and assign clubs rooms and time slots for room monitoring.

Answer any questions of the committee. Correspond with the school and book the location.

Fashion Revue Committee

Select a theme for the public fashion revue by the May 4–H Council meeting.

Plan and prepare decorations for the public fashion revue.

Set up and decorate prior to the evening public fashion revue.

Clean up stage decorations and fashion revue location. Return all items to appropriate places.

Committee members may also be asked to help with judging tear down.



Facts about 4-H Council:

- Meetings last about an 30 minutes.
- All meetings begin at 7:00 p.m.
- Meetings are held at the Extension Office Meeting Room located in the Cowley County Courthouse.
- 4-H Council has a President, Vice President, Secretary/Reporter and Treasurer. Officers are elected at the September meeting.
- There are 6 meetings held in a year.
- Meetings are held on the third Monday of every other month, except January, due to holiday conflicts and July.

Meetings for the 2016-17 year are: November 21st, January 23rd, March 20th, May 15th, July 29th and September 18th. What to Expect:

- Council meetings are called to order by the President. A person is selected, by the President, to lead the group in the flag salute and 4-H pledge.
- Officer reports are then given, followed by an agent report.
- Committee reports are given.
- New business is discussed and votes are taken.
- Announcements are offered, followed by adjournment

4-H Council is an organization that represents the views of each club. As a representative, you represent your club's viewpoints during 4-H Council. The representatives are responsible for taking information back to the 4-H Club. If a representative must be absent, it is recommended that a replacement be found for that meeting.


